Principal's Report

School Saving Bonus reminder and allocation to school activities

The Victorian Government is delivering the School Saving Bonus (SSB) – a one-off support of \$400 for eligible government school students from Prep to Year 12 in 2025.

The SSB can be used for uniforms and textbooks until Monday 30 June 2025.

Any funds remaining after 30 June 2025, including online voucher amounts that have not been redeemed, will become a credit to use on school activities. However, the credit will not be available on your family account at our school until late July. To use any remaining SSB funds to cover the cost of school activities in July, please refer to the SSB online system and allocate the funds to school activities before 30 June 2025. System guide translations are also available in 14 languages.

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF)

The CSEF helps eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you have a valid means-tested concession card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. Means-tested concession cards must be valid on the first day of Term 1, 2025 (Tuesday 28 January 2025) or Term 2, 2025 (Tuesday 22 April 2025).

A student aged 16 years and over who is considered a mature minor and holds a valid concession card is also eligible to apply.

Eligible families will receive a payment of \$154 per year for primary school students and \$256 per year for secondary school students [remove primary/ secondary as necessary]. The funds will be paid directly to the school to be used towards camps, sports and excursion costs for the benefit of your child.

If you applied for CSEF through our school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year, unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

IB PYP

Grade 3/4 Inquiry Unit

For the first half of this term our unit of work is on 'Sharing the Planet' with a central idea of: *The design of buildings and structures is dependent upon the community's needs, environment and available material.*


During this unit we will be focusing on how and why buildings are designed, the materials used and the needs of the community. We will be looking at housing around the world and culminating in designing and constructing our own model buildings.

Last week we looked at houses around the world and how they differ depending on community and environmental needs. We then worked in pairs or threes to design and make earthquake proof houses out of toothpicks and playdough. We tested these using a shake table to see if they could withstand the ground shaking. Most of our houses survived but that could have been due to all of the playdough holding them together!!

A part of this unit we are also putting the call out to any parent who works in building or building design that might like to come along and talk to the class about their work and the process of designing with environmental and community needs in mind. If you are able to help please let us know and we will organise a time.

























Spelling at MMPS

At MMPS, we implement an extensive spelling testing program at the beginning of each year to identify each child's areas of strength and areas for improvement. This process creates an individualised plan that outlines the specific spelling rules each student needs to focus on.

Every week, your child will work on a spelling rule identified as a priority for them, with their spelling words directly linked to that rule.

Students are tested each week on these words and teachers specifically look for these words in their writing as well.

We encourage families to explore additional words that follow the same rule at home. We believe this approach provides students with the best opportunity to develop their spelling skills effectively.



Recognising and Celebrating IDAHOBIT

DigiTech

In Digital Technologies, our junior students explored the magic behind musical greeting cards. We began by examining one of these cards and brainstorming how it might work—ideas ranged from tiny CDs and motion sensors to... a miniature person with an instrument living inside the card. Then, the real fun began as we carefully pulled one apart to reveal the tiny electronic components inside.

We discovered a small motherboard with a chip programmed to play music and a simple metal switch that completes a circuit when the card is opened. This led to a fascinating discussion about open and closed circuits— how electricity only flows when the circuit is complete (closed), and how opening the card causes paper to move out from under the metal strip to allow it to connect with the circuit board, closing the circuit and triggering the music.

Rather than building our own tiny musical circuits (which would be tricky and not very sustainable), we explored modern digital alternatives. We learned about QR codes—how they can store links to audio and video messages and are far more versatile and efficient than traditional barcodes.

Students then handmade their own Mother's Day cards, recorded a personal message, generated a QR code, and added it to their card design.

So, this Mother's Day, keep your phone close by—you'll need it to scan the QR code and hear a beautiful, heartfelt message made just for you (and let's be honest, it beats another scented candle).
