GRADE 2/3 CLASS UPDATE

READING

In Reading we are exploring the difference between reading fluently and reading with expression when reading aloud. We have been practising this through shared reading, 'The Tricky Sleepover' and through paired reading.

MATH

In Maths we have been learning to solve vertical multiplication equations involving one and two-digit numbers. We are now using our understanding of multiplication to help us solve division equations.

WRITING

In Writing we have been practising to summarise information from non-fiction texts through researching information about the First Fleet, as part of our new Inquiry unit.

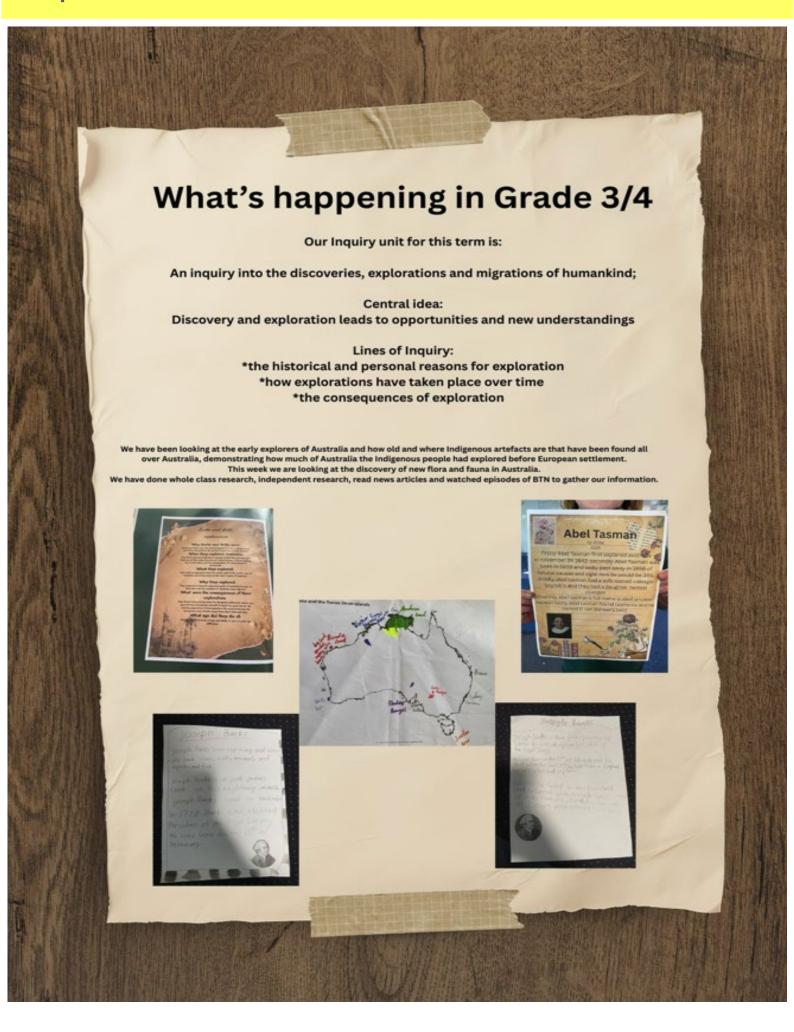
WELLBEING

As part of our Respectful Relationships/Wellbeing sessions, our class recently discussed the difference between 'safe' and 'unsafe' secrets.

SAFE secrets being about things that will make someone happy and don't last long (ie. Making a parent a surprise breakfast in bed or keeping a birthday present a secret from its intended recipient). UNSAFE secrets being about someone being hurt or doing the wrong thing (ie. Secrets that make someone

unsafe, feel uncomfortable and/or involve doing the wrong thing). We linked these discussions to 'NO, GO, TELL' (say NO, GO away from the situation, TELL a trusted adult). These lessons are taught to empower our students, to ensure they feel/are kept safe.



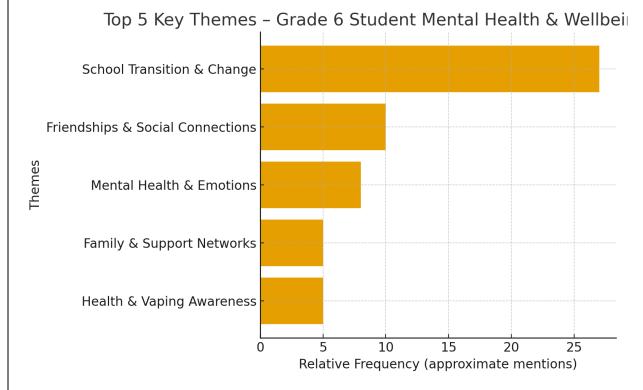


Macedon Ranges Health

Overall, the main areas of focus are **anxiety around transitioning to secondary school**, **peer and social connections**, and **general wellbeing and mental health**.

As part of MMPS's Tier 2 wellbeing supports — following the girls' program earlier in the year — the workshop helps students prepare for the transition to secondary school as well as focusing on confidence, resilience, positive relationships, emotional wellbeing and challenging gender stereotypes. The 3 wonderful facilitators worked with students in a fun & interactive way, providing practical strategies and tools to help navigate this important stage.

Junior School Council & Mental Health Awareness Month

The Junior School Council leaders Eleanor, Clem and I have been busy planning a fun whole-school activity for this Friday to recognise **Mental Health Awareness Month**.

Students will come together in 'community groups' (students from across all year levels), with each group supported by a staff member. Protecting Against Mosquito-borne Disease

Warm and wet weather can result in greater numbers of mosquitoes and an increased risk of illness from mosquito bites. While the overall risk is currently low, some mosquitoes may be carrying diseases that make people sick. The best protection against mosquito-borne illness is to avoid mosquito bites.

Families can protect against mosquito bites by:

- covering up as much as possible with long, loose-fitting, light-coloured clothing
- applying insect repellent that contains picaridin or DEET on exposed skin when outdoors
- limiting outdoor activity if lots of mosquitoes are active
- clean up and remove containers and items around the home that may hold water where mosquitoes may breed.

Families with any health concerns should see their doctor or phone NURSE-ON-CALL: 1300 606 024 (available 24 hours).

Free Japanese encephalitis vaccines

Japanese encephalitis virus is spread to humans through bites from infected mosquitoes and can cause a rare but potentially serious infection of the brain.

Year 3-6 classroom program: Wednesday 5 November, Fridays 7, 14 November 2025

Year 3

3 x 60-minute sessions over 3-week program

- learn the proper names for simple reproductive and private parts
- talk about concepts of public and private, and learn about body safety, including body signals, identifying trusted adults and consent
- discussion about families
- talk about emotions and how to manage them
- growing up and change including an introduction to puberty

Year 4

3 x 60-minute sessions over 3-week program

- learn and revise the proper names for private and reproductive parts
- concepts of public and private, body safety, body signals, identifying trusted adults and consent
- discussion about families and what it means to be in a family
- simple explanation of conception, pregnancy and birth
- discuss growing and changing and highlight some of the changes of puberty

Year 5/6 (P2 program)

3 x 90-minute sessions over 3-week program Week 1

- revise the names and functions of reproductive body parts
- reinforce body safety messages and the concept of body autonomy and consent
- · conception, pregnancy and birth explained
- revise the physical changes of puberty and how to manage them

Week 2

- discuss periods and wet dreams and how to manage them
- discuss the social and emotional changes of puberty and practical tips on how to manage them
- discuss the range of feelings that individuals have about puberty; how to be supportive, kind and empathetic to peers

Week 3

- answer student questions from question box
- explore friendships and family relationships and discuss how to manage conflict
- discuss responsible, respectful and safe use of technology and social media
- identify trusted adults who students can talk to for support and where they can go for more information
